Safe Havens Freedom Talks (SH|FT), together with **Safemuse**, presents a special Freedom Talk episode, which features a panel talk and a set of musical performances that took place at the conference "Free Art – Free Movement" (*Fri Kunst – Fri Bevegelse*). The event gathered dozens of Norwegian organisations, institutions, cultural initiatives and artists at Riksscenen in Oslo during Artistic Freedom Week 2022. The episode starts with a short performance by "Inkognito", an anonymous activist from Afghanistan who, following the Taliban's seizure of power, was forced to leave her home country and now lives in hiding in Norway. Thereafter, **Guro Kleveland**, editor of the Norwegian online-magazine *Ballade*, heads an all-female panel talk with Venezuelan singer in the all-female salsa band *Las Karamba*, **Ayhvin Bruno**, Cuban activist **Dayami Ross**, and Egyptian oud-player and sound artist **Yasmine El Baramawy**. Yasmine El Baramawy closes off with a mini-concert together with Danish tuba player **Rasmus Svale Kjærgård Lund**. This event is produced in collaboration with **Safemuse**, **Riksscenen**, **Ballade and SalsaNor**.
